TERRY'S TOP TIPS

Extracts from the Chestnut Newsletters

A question was about Finishing Oil. Our correspondent had a 1 litre can, which he was halfway through, and the remaining oil was starting to thicken up, even though the lid was firmly on.

This, sadly, isn't unusual. The oil is oxidising, reacting with the air in the can. It's how the oil works, and there's not much we can do to the product to prevent it.

But we do have a solution. Our <u>Air Purge Spray</u> will remove the air from the can, and leave an inert layer of heavier-than-air gas inside, to prevent the oil reacting and setting.

It's very effective at slowing down (practically stopping) the oxidisation, and will keep the oil good as new for a very long time. It's a powerful spray, though, so just be careful when using it on a can that is still nearly full! You only want to force the air out, not the oil as well.

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We were asked for a finish for coasters, and also pot stands. We were happy to suggest either Melamine Lacquer, Acrylic Gloss/Satin Lacquer or Hard Wax Oil on the coasters, they will stand up to a lot of abuse.

The pot stand, though, is a different matter. Pots that come out of the oven would be much hotter, possibly 200 degrees C. For these, we felt that no finish would be best. Anything that was put on would be likely to get damaged very quickly, and look tatty very quickly.

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I was asked by an overseas customer this week about how long to leave Friction Polish before using Burnishing Cream on it. Burnishing Cream has a very fine abrasive in it, which is great at polishing a surface, and technically it'd be possible to strip the Friction Polish off the surface, as it's relatively soft. I say 'possible' but I've never managed to do it, either deliberately or by mistake. It would require some considerable heavy-handedness!

Friction Polish is pretty much force-dried during application; I usually say to give it a minute to cool down afterwards, and it's safe to use the Burnishing Cream after that.

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We often get asked about sealing wood prior to painting a design on it. This came up again a couple of weeks ago.

The answer depends mostly on what type of paint is being used. Normally, it's an acrylic paint, so our Acrylic Sanding Sealer or Cellulose Sanding Sealer would be fine with this. (If in doubt, use the cellulose one, this will work with most top coats—but do a test first!)

The other thing to consider here is which topcoat will be applied. Again, if unsure, use the Acrylic Lacquer (one of the aerosols is best); this will work on either sealer, and shouldn't affect the painted design.
