#### **TERRY'S TOP TIPS**

#### **Extracts from the Chestnut Newsletters**

We were asked about a good finish for charred timber. Burning wood to colour it is very popular, and can give some very good effects.

In a way, this question is similar to one we covered a few weeks ago, about finishing laser engraved wood. The most important thing here is to make sure that any soot or bunt debris is removed from the surface first, as this will prevent any coating from adhering properly.

Once this has been removed, pretty much any of our products will be fine to go on the wood, just pick the one best suited to the item being made.

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If something is toy safe, is it also food safe? Not really, on this one. In particular, a lacquer had been requested to be used on a small cake box.

I don't know why a lacquer had been specified, the only reason I could think of was so that it could be washed, but this is a big ask even for a lacquer.

My suggestion here was to make the box around a glass or plastic insert that could be removed for cleaning and hygiene.

Although, would the cakes be in direct contact? If paper cases were being used, this

contact? If paper cases were being used, this should, I'd imagine, remove the need for the food safe aspect?

The best choice, of course, would be our Food Safe Finish, although obviously this is an oil, not a lacquer.

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A question came in about which finish to use to avoid any yellowing of the timber, which was particularly white, in this case. And, a satin finish was required.

The water based finishes are usually best for this, and as a subtle finish was required, it would come down to either the Acrylic Satin Lacquer or the Satin Wipe-On Poly. Either will do the job, it depends on what method of application is preferred.

Lemon Oil is also a candidate here, but, being an oil, this can darken the timber more than is desired.

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A question about the Buffing System to finish off with, this week.

This one is about the Dome Buffs; will they achieve the same finish on the inside of a bowl as the one the Buffing Wheels give on the outside?

The answer is yes...but it can take a while.

The Dome Buffs are much smaller, and their pattern of contact is very different to the wheels. We'd suggest using a bit more speed with the domes, and spend longer with each grade to get the best finish possible. Your patience will be rewarded!
